Thoughts for the Journey

Whenever September rolls around, our common energy quickly moves to the beginning of another church year, Welcome Home Sunday, and the start of the fall Sunday School program. In addition, our collective thoughts gravitate to the school year...and to our children and grandchildren. What will school be like for them? What new things will they learn? Will they have a good teacher and caring friends? What new insights, understandings, and experiences will they bring home to share?

Of course, in the Christian life, we are always "in school" so to speak. We are constantly attempting to learn, follow, and understand the ways of Jesus more fully. And in the process of learning the principles that Jesus taught, we become more whole as human beings...and more capable as his disciples. As you know, this is a lifelong process.

Brother Roger, the founder of the Taizé community in France, once put it this way: "Do not close yourself. Live the little bit of gospel you have grasped." (*The Life and Vision of Brother Roger of Taizé*, p. 26) In my own journey, I am fully aware that I only grasp bits and pieces of the Good News as I seek to be a faithful follower of the Way. In fact, I would venture to say that as followers of Jesus Christ, we are all perpetual students of life and faith.

So as we begin our journey together in the Metro District this fall....through clergy colloquies and lay leadership conversations, through new ventures in ministry and different formats for our annual charge conferences...I hope that we will use these occasions as opportunities to reflect on where we want to go as communities of faith and how we want to live as followers of Jesus Christ. Maybe our time together can become new opportunities to grasp bits and pieces of the Good News in different ways.

More Kits Needed for West Depot, Salt Lake City

Hard working teams at the UMCOR West Depot in Salt Lake City highlighted the need for Metro District churches to continue making the four kinds of disaster kits designated for Haiti. Donna and Glenn Waltman delivered a carload of kits August 18 to join a team of volunteers from California.

After sending 70,000 Health Kits to Haiti just last week, the huge warehouse seemed half empty. The Waltman's learned quickly how to process Health, Layette, Birthing and School kits. Still, another room of unfinished kits awaited work. Brian Diggs, director of the depot, told how between May and November teams arrive from as far away as Chicago. They stay in an Episcopal retreat house or in local churches, to work at the depot. Metro churches are urged to make even more kits in the coming weeks so they can be in the next shipment that goes to Pakistan.

Local Church Conferences to Have New Look

Each fall we have gathered in our local churches for the All-Church Conference, at which time reports about the state of our congregation were received and a program of information/education/inspiration was offered to the entire congregation.

This year, as part of the Conference-wide shift to focusing on creating healthy, vital congregations, we will be doing the Fall conferences differently.

The business aspect will be handled as a charge conference. The membership of the charge conference includes all members of the Church Council/Ad Board, together with any retired or extension ministers or others who hold their charge conference with that congregation. (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶ 246.2)

The required list of reports has been streamlined, and churches will receive this new list in the coming weeks. A designated elder will preside in place of the District Superintendent, and all conferences will be scheduled between mid-October and mid-November. They can even take place at the regular meeting time of the Church Council or Ad Board.

This approach will free up time for the church leadership to meet one-on-one with the Metro District Assistant to the Bishop, Rev. Lowell Greathouse, at another time to discuss the mission and future vision of your congregation. These visits will be scheduled beginning in September and go into the winter. Pakistan Flood-Affected Areas Still Growing

Flood-affected areas of Pakistan are equal to the "entire size of England, Bangladesh, or Cuba" and continue to grow, according to the United Nations. Some 17.2 million people are "significantly affected," 1.2 million homes are destroyed, and 800,000 people are completely cut off by floodwaters.

At the end of last week, more than a million people were evacuated from threatened towns in Sindh province, said news reports. A total of six million people have been displaced since the flooding began more than a month ago.

UMCOR is working with partners Church World Service, Muslim Aid, and GlobalMedic in Pakistan, and last week supplied a new grant to GlobalMedic to bring medical aid, via an inflatable field hospital, and clean water to Punjab province.

Afghanistan: UMCOR Responds To Flash Floods

The same torrential rains wreaking havoc on Pakistan are also causing destruction and displacement in neighboring Afghanistan. Some 106 people died and thousands of homes were destroyed in 15 of Afghanistan's 34 provinces due to flash flooding over the past month.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), together with the International Rescue Committee (IRC), provided tents to the 800 affected families in the Mohammed Agha District of Logar province who lost their homes in the flooding, meeting 100 percent of the need for temporary shelter.

UMCOR continues to assess the damages in Logar, particularly to water sources, and the need for more permanent housing, as part of its ongoing response to the emergency.

Us: Katrina, Five Years Later

Sunday, August 29, marked the fifth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, which ravaged the US Gulf Coast of Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. The most destructive storm in US history, Katrina caused 1,800 deaths, drove more than a million people from their homes, and provoked \$125 billion in damages.

United Methodist Bishop William W. Hutchinson of Louisiana said UMCOR was there from the start. "UMCOR workers have never left our side," he wrote in a UMNS commentary. "They have shepherded us through five years of response. They are still with us, as United Methodists are still fully engaged in recovery—the last of the major denominations on the ground."

"I feel UMCOR has been faithful to our constituents and good stewards of the donations they entrusted to us," Rev. Tom Hazelwood, UMCOR executive for US disaster response, wrote in a blog. "Lives of both those who received assistance and those who volunteered were touched, and, I pray, God was glorified."

Us: Katrina, Five Years Later

Sunday, August 29, marked the fifth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, which ravaged the US Gulf Coast of Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. The membership of the charge conference includes all members of the Church Council/Ad Board, together with any retired or extension ministers or others who hold their charge conference with that congregation. (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶ 246.2)

The required list of reports has been streamlined, and churches will receive this new list in the coming weeks. A designated elder will preside in place of the District Superintendent, and all conferences will be scheduled between mid-October and mid-November. They can even take place at the regular meeting time of the Church Council or Ad Board.

This approach will free up time for the church leadership to meet one-on-one with the Metro District Assistant to the Bishop, Rev. Lowell Greathouse, at another time to discuss the mission and future vision of your congregation. These visits will be scheduled beginning in September and go into the winter. (*Metro Connection September 2010*)

Pakistan Flood-Affected Areas Still Growing

Flood-affected areas of Pakistan are equal to the "entire size of England, Bangladesh, or Cuba" and continue to grow, according to the United Nations. Some 17.2 million people are "significantly affected," 1.2 million homes are destroyed, and 800,000 people are completely cut off by floodwaters.

At the end of last week, more than a million people were evacuated from threatened towns in Sindh province, said news reports. A total of six million people have been displaced since the flooding began more than a month ago.

UMCOR is working with partners Church World Service, Muslim Aid, and GlobalMedic in Pakistan, and last week supplied a new grant to GlobalMedic to bring medical aid, via an inflatable field hospital, and clean water to Punjab province.

Afghanistan: UMCOR Responds To Flash Floods

The same torrential rains wreaking havoc on Pakistan are also causing destruction and displacement in neighboring Afghanistan. Some 106 people died and thousands of homes were destroyed in 15 of Afghanistan's 34 provinces due to flash flooding over the past month.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), together with the International Rescue Committee (IRC), provided tents to the 800 affected families in the Mohammed Agha District of Logar province who lost their homes in the flooding, meeting 100 percent of the need for temporary shelter.

UMCOR continues to assess the damages in Logar, particularly to water sources, and the need for more permanent housing, as part of its ongoing response to the emergency.

Us: Katrina, Five Years Later

Sunday, August 29, marked the fifth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, which ravaged the US Gulf Coast of Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. The most destructive storm in US history, Katrina caused 1,800 deaths, drove more than a million people from their homes, and provoked \$125 billion in damages.

United Methodist Bishop William W. Hutchinson of Louisiana said UMCOR was there from the start. "UMCOR workers have never left our side," he wrote in a UMNS commentary. "They have shepherded us through five years of response. They are still with us, as United Methodists are still fully engaged in recovery—the last of the major denominations on the ground."

"I feel UMCOR has been faithful to our constituents and good stewards of the donations they entrusted to us," Rev. Tom Hazelwood, UMCOR executive for US disaster response, wrote in a blog. "Lives of both those who received assistance and those who volunteered were touched, and, I pray, God was glorified."
